

As the fifth oldest active children's theatre in the nation, Youtheatre is dedicated to its mission to "educate, engage and entertain" through quality theatrical experiences. In 1934, Dr. Clive McAllister, president of the Old Fort Players (now the Civic Theatre), appointed a committee to create a junior or children's theater branch of the organization. The committee established the philosophy that the new "Children's Theatre" would develop poise, better diction, and self-esteem for children through dramatic instruction. They would give at least one play a year, and awaken enthusiasm in children for beauty in art and integrity in dramatic literature.

The first class began with an enrollment of a whopping 40 students, each of which paid just \$1.00 for 8 classes! The first production, "The Steadfast Tin Soldier," was performed at the Majestic Theatre in Fort Wayne and had a cast of 75 young people. Tickets were only 10 cents for children and 25 cents for adults.

In 1954, the Majestic Theatre was deemed unsafe for children by the fire department and so the Children's Theatre spent the next 10 years at various locations in the city. By the time it rejoined the Civic Theatre at the Old Palace Theatre, it had a new name, the "Fort Wayne Youtheatre." In 1973, both organizations moved to their current home in the Arts United Center on E. Main Street in downtown Fort Wayne. The Youtheatre became autonomous in 1984.

In 1978, Broadway star Harvey Cocks became the Executive Director of Youtheatre. Even after retiring from that position, Harvey remained as our Artist in Residence; inspiring young artists for over forty years until his death in 2022. In 2010, Leslie Hormann took the reigns, serving as Executive/Artistic Director until 2018, followed by Todd Espeland (2018-2024).

Today, Youtheatre is led by Executive Director Heather Closson, Artistic Director Christopher J. Murphy, and a staff of outstanding local artists who serve as teaching artists, directors, choreographers, music directors, designers, and more.

For over three quarters of a century, Youtheatre has produced classes, camps and theatrical productions for the artists and audiences of northeast Indiana. Our touring "Youtheatre-On-The-Go" troupe takes literature-based shows into the community, performing in hospitals, libraries, community centers and more. In 2018, our Linda L. Ruffolo "Young Heroes of Conscience" Series, which has spotlighted the likes of Anne Frank, Ryan White, Harriet Tubman and Ruby Bridges, won the "Mayor's Arts Award."



### ELEMENTS OF A PRODUCTION

### SETS

The scenery pieces that form the area in which the performers act out the play. Sometimes scenery is very realistic, making the audience think they are inside a real house, for example. Other times the scenery is quite fanciful or limited. What different sets can you name in the show? What time and place does it look like?

### LĪGHTS

The lighting instruments that help to create the right atmosphere on the stage. Lights direct the attention of the audience to specific areas of the stage or to a specific performer. The lights may be different colors to add special effects such as nighttime or a storm. How do the lights in this production show changes in the time and place?

### PROPS

The objects performers carry to help them act out the story. Look for important props that help define character or place. Can you name a few?

### MAKE-UP

The cosmetic bases, blushes, lipsticks, mascara and eye liners which helps the performer physically become the character he/she is playing. Make-up is also used so that the performers facial features can be seen clearly under the bright stage lights from a distance. Do you notice any special make-up in the show?

### COSTUMES

The clothing the performers wear. Depending on the story being acted out, this clothing may be what a character of the time would have actually worn. It may also be very exaggerated or fantastic in the case of a dream or a fairy-tale. Costumes help the audience know what a character is like or where and when he/she lived. Are the costumes drab or colorful? Do they look realistic? What do they tell you about the time and place?

#### TERRENCE McNALLY, BOOK

Recipient of the Dramatists Guild of America Lifetime Achievement Award, Tony Awards for his plays Master Class and Love! Valour! Compassion! and his musical librettos Kiss of the Spider Woman and Ragtime and an Emmy Award for Andre's Mother. In 1996 he was inducted into the American Theatre Hall of Fame. An anthology of his plays, Terrence McNally: A Memoir In Plays, was recently published by Grove Press. He has written the libretto for two operas, Deadman Walking and Great Scott, both with Jake Heggie. There was a celebration of his work at the Kennedy Center in 2010 including the world premiere of **Golden Age**. **ANASTASIA** is his third collaboration with Lynn Ahrens and Stephen Flaherty and his first with Darko Tresnjak.

Recipient of the Tony, Drama Desk, Outer Critics Circle Award and two Grammy nominations for Broadway's Ragtime. Nominated for two Academy Awards and two Golden Globes for Twentieth Century Fox's animated feature film **ANASTASIA**. Inducted into the Theater Hall of Fame in 2015. Other musicals include: In Your Arms, Little Dancer, The Glorious Ones, Loving Repeating, Dessa Rose, A Man of No Importance, Lucky Stiff. Awards for his work in the theater include the Tony, Drama Desk, Outer Critics Circle and Olivier. He has been nominated for the Grammy three times. ### BIOGRAPHY: The Mystery of the Romanovs

Use this brief biography about the famous Romanov Family to learn more about the tragic fate of the royal family




The Romanov family was the last royal family to rule Russia, from 1613 until 1917. The most famous members of the family were Tsar Nicholas II, his wife Tsarina Alexandra, and their five children: Olga, Tatiana, Maria, Anastasia, and Alexei.

Nicholas II became Tsar in 1894 and tried his best to lead Russia, but it was a very challenging time with many problems. His wife, Alexandra, was very close to a mysterious man named Rasputin, who many people didn't trust. Rasputin claimed he could help their son Alexei, who was very sick with a disease called hemophilia that made him bleed excessively.

In 1917, a big revolution happened in Russia because many people were unhappy and wanted change. Nicholas II had to step down as Tsar, and the family was put under house arrest. They were moved to a place called Ekaterinburg. Sadly, in 1918, they were all killed by a group called the Bolsheviks.

The story of the Romanov family is very famous and has been told in many books and movies. People remember them for their bravery during a very difficult time. There are even stories and legends about the youngest daughter, Anastasia, and some people believed she might have escaped. The Russian Orthodox Church made them saints, and they are remembered with respect and love.



# BIOGRAPHY: The Lost Princess

Learn more about the mystery of Grand Duchess Anastasia Nikolaevna of Russia

After the tragic end of the Romanov family in 1918, a mysterious and fascinating story emerged about Anastasia, the youngest daughter of Tsar Nicholas II and Tsarina Alexandra. Some people believed that Anastasia might have survived the terrible event that claimed her family's lives.

This belief was fueled by rumors and stories from people who claimed to have seen her or helped her escape. The most famous case was that of Anna Anderson, a woman who appeared in Germany in the 1920s and said she was Anastasia. She had scars and some knowledge about the royal family that made people wonder if she could really be the lost princess.

In the 1990s, the remains of the Romanov family were discovered and identified through DNA testing, which showed that all of Nicholas II's children had been killed in 1918. In 2007, more remains were found and confirmed to be those of Anastasia and her brother Alexei, finally solving the mystery.

Despite the evidence, the story of Anastasia's possible escape remains a captivating tale of hope and mystery. It reminds us of the power of legends and how they can endure even in the face of facts.





The mystery of Anastasia's fate captured the imagination of people around the world and inspired books, movies, and even a popular animated film.

The 1956 film "Anastasia," directed by Anatole Litvak, stars Ingrid Bergman as an amnesiac woman believed to be the Grand Duchess Anastasia Nikolaevna of Russia. In post-revolutionary Paris, Russian expatriates, led by General Bounine (Yul Brynner), groom her to claim an inheritance. The film explores her journey of self-discovery and the possibility of her true identity. Bergman's performance won an Academy Award for Best Actress.

This animated film, simply titled "Anastasia," tells a fictionalized version of her story, where she grows up not knowing her true identity and later discovers her royal heritage, embarking on an adventure to reclaim her place as a princess.

The animated film became very popular and introduced many children to the legend of Anastasia. It portrayed her as a brave and kind young woman who overcame great obstacles, which made the story even more enchanting. The film's songs and characters made it a beloved classic.

Imperial Russia was a time in Russian history when the country was ruled by emperors and empresses, from the early 1700s until 1917. It all started with Peter the Great, who became emperor in 1721. He did many things to make Russia stronger and more modern, like building a big navy and creating new cities.

One of the most famous rulers after Peter was Catherine the Great. She ruled from 1762 to 1796 and was known for her love of art, education, and expanding Russia's borders. Under her rule, Russia grew bigger and became more powerful.

During this time, Russia became one of the largest empires in the world, stretching from Europe all the way across Asia to North America. 

- Fold between each doll, so it standartically.





- Tape the straps to fit


